




## The Trail

The complete trail is a circa 6.5 km circular route with various shorter linking options. There are twenty four interpretive boards along the trail, giving information on the various historical periods


- The Early Years (Prior to 1770)
- The Agricultural Improvement/Pre-Railway Period (1770 - 1848)
- The Railway Period (1848 1966)
- The Post-Railway Period following the opening of the Tay Road Bridge

Each board carries a small rubbing plaque which can be used as a memento of the trail and also a QR code




